JOHN PAUL THORNTON



John Paul Thornton is an American artist, educator and speaker. He is the author of the book: "Art And Courage: Stories to Inspire the Artist-Warrior Within."

Early in his career, while teaching art to underprivileged children, he learned that one of his students was reported as "missing." As a way to honor the families who have endured such a loss, John Paul created a series of paintings depicting the faces of America's missing children. Numbering in the hundreds, they have been exhibited in many public installations, most notably Washington, D.C. He worked in Haiti through a grant from the United Nations Foundation (Merridian Health, the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) through the Los Angeles Department of Cultural Affairs).

He has taught at The Los Angeles County Museum of Art, California State University of Los Angeles, The Skirball Cultural Center, American Jewish University, Pierce College, the Los Angeles Unified School District Conservatory of the Arts, Valley JCC and the Sophia School of painting in Tokyo, Japan. He also served as Art Education Coordinator with the City of Los Angeles Department of Cultural Affairs working on projects with MOCA, the Getty Research Institute and on International Sister-City exchanges with Taxco, Mexico. John Paul's paintings are in numerous private collections.





The Breed Street Shul Project is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization whose mission is to bring together the Jewish, Latino and other communities of Los Angeles by rehabilitating the landmark Breed Street Shul in Boyle Heights. By transforming the campus into a center of arts, culture, education, and service for its current neighbors, we will make it a place of learning, teaching and wonder for all.

In the middle of the 1990's, Jewish community activists saw that unless the Shul was restored soon, a precious part of the city's Jewish heritage would disappear. Along with Boyle Heights residents, we envisioned an adaptive reuse that would not only preserve the past but would also energize the neighborhood. Together, both groups formed a new organization that would broadcast this vision to the city and make it a reality. After acquiring the buildings, we have spent the last several years engaged in doing the emergency structural work to prevent ongoing deterioration of the landmark Byzantine Revival Building and completing the rehabilitation of the Historic 1915 Building behind the larger structure, which had been the original synagogue. Now, for the first time in decades, the Breed Street Shul is a center of activity and a resource for Boyle Heights.

Our goal is not just to restore a building: it is to assist in revitalizing a neighborhood and enriching our city. The Breed Street Shul Project (BSSP) has been commended by Partners for Sacred Places (a national interfaith group) as being the only preservation project of a former religious property that is focused not merely on a "museum" use, or on a completely new use unrelated to the site's past, but rather as one that combines preservation of an icon of Jewish history with engagement with another community and the creation of opportunities for educational advancement, social justice and volunteerism.

FRANK ROMERO




CALAVERA CAR, 1997 OIL ON CANVAS

Frank Romero (Born 1941 in Boyle Heights) grew up in the Hispanic, Asian, and Jewish communities of East Los Angeles. He began painting when he was five years old and as a teenager attended LA's Otis Art Institute, one of the best art schools in the nation. Romero did not think of himself as a Chicano until he began to work with three other artists in an informal group known as Los Four. Los Four and other Hispanic artists throughout the West used wall murals, graffiti, and street theater to protest America's involvement in Vietnam and Southeast Asia.

Romero has successfully balanced a career in both the public and private arenas. He has completed over 15 murals throughout Los Angeles and was a key contributor to the 1984 Olympic Arts Festival with "Going to the Olympics," a large-scale mural which adorned one of Los Angeles' busiest freeways (Highway 101). In 2012 he created a print of the same image after the mural was painted over. Romero's brightly colored paintings celebrate the Los Angeles culture of lowriders and "rascuache," the art of making something beautiful out of the ordinary.

Romero has exhibited extensively in the United States, Europe and Japan. His work is featured in many permanent collections, including the National Museum of Art in Washington, D.C., the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, and the Carnegie Museum in Oxnard, CA.


